THE UGAIRISH FARM

e have had a busy year with the farm and farm school, and many things have been achieved. The seventeen volunteers who went out in June 2009 had a wonderful time and worked very hard on various projects, including:

- Dismantling and rebuilding a tool store and office
- Hanging doors in the Primary and Senior school's latrines
- Fixing windows, doors and floors in 5 classrooms
- Painting classrooms and dormitories
- Teaching geography and crafts in the primary and senior schools
- Teaching carpentry in the farm school
- Sewing uniforms for school children
- Making curtains for the dormitories
- Eye-tests for all the students and teachers
- De-worming programme
- Weeding and planting vegetables
- Attending to the pigs, goats and hens
- Bringing milk each day to the orphans
- Bringing supplies to needy families in the bush

The team brought clothes, school supplies, tools and medicines out with them, which were distributed to the orphans and schools. All the supplies for the various projects were purchased in the nearby town of Masaka as well as animal feeds, maize and vegetable seeds.

Since last summer, a pineapple-growing project has been started and it is hoped that the sale of the pineapples will provide some income for the farm. Also, the pigs have been breeding successfully and are another source of income. Due to a very dry summer season, when there was a lack of grass for the cows, the milk yield was down. This meant there was less milk for the orphans each week. However, the hens are laying well and a new hen house is in the process of being built.

Apollo, the farm manager, sends detailed reports each month of the farm's progress and accounts so that we can keep up to date. The Ugairish Project finances the running costs of the animals and crops monthly.
