

Carlow-based charity Ugalrish Project has been helping in Baale, a fishing community of about 400 people, on Lake Victoria in Uganda, since 2013. We have, amongst other things, provided a bore-hole for drinking water, sanitary facilities, a three-classroom kindergarten school, twice-monthly doctor visits and set up a women's co-operative with support for vegetable growing and dress-making.

However, fish stocks in Lake Victoria are declining, and new government regulations on fishing net mesh size, intended to conserve the stocks, make it increasingly difficult for the fishermen to scratch a living. We want to set up a fish farming co-operative, rearing fish in floating cages on the lake, as an alternative livelihood for them. We want to give them hope, and a future.

Initial capital costs of the venture are not high, less than €1500 to make three cages as a pilot project, but it then takes about 8 months to bring the fish fry to marketable size, and the feeding and related costs during this time will be about €9000. Thereafter it should be a self-sustaining venture. With provision for some initial training and support by experienced cage fish farmers, we estimate that we will need about €12,000 to get the project started.
